SHOW AND TELL:

After the October 24th meeting, we had a show and tell program.

Jim Senkewitz, our "golf topic collector", presented a talk on the two round golf ball shaped stamps issued on August 12, 2004. The stamps measure 43 mm in diameter and will be sold in a pane of eight with folder. Lowe-Martin printed 6 million of the self-adhesive stamps, using 8-colour lithography plus multi-level embossing and foil (one color) on Fasson paper. The stamp is general tagged all around. The Official First Day Cover will read OAKVILLE ON.

Tom Reiff presented a talk on three postal history items. They were as follows:

- A cover from 1948 sent to the Boston Braves Baseball Club for World Series Tickets and returned with a handstamp "TICKET SUPPLY EXHAUSTED, SORRY".
- A cover from 1925 sent from Montserrat (Leeward Islands) to Pittsburgh, PA using a combination of stamps from both Montserrat and the Leeward Islands.
- A cover with letter dated December 9, 1941 (the day after the U.S. declared war on Japan, but not yet with Germany)
 addressed to Holland. Returned to sender by censor due to being sent to and enemy or enemy occupied territory (not true
 until December 11, 1941).

We would like to have more members bring in one or more of their collecting "treasures" to share with us at our next show-and-tell program. It is YOUR Club. Think about it!

DID YOU KNOW - INTERESTING PHILATELIC FACT:

Due to the quarantine of horses, the equestrian events for the 1956 summer Olympic Games were held in Stockholm, Sweden. This marked the only time, and so far, only time, that events of the Olympics were held in different countries. Because of this, stamps were issued by "both" Olympic countries. Australia issued stamps in 1954 (Scott #277), 1955 (Scott #286) and two Stamps in 1956 (Scott #288-289). Sweden issued three coil stamps (Scott #487-489) and the two lower values in booklet form (Scott #490-491, booklet pane (#490a-491a).

THANKSGIVING STAMP IMAGE ANSWER:

Did you a look at the Thanksgiving stamp image at the top of the November, 2004 newsletter. Notice anything peculiar? This stamp "design" was issued on October 19, 2001. Were you able to determine what was peculiar?

ANSWER: The image of this stamp, when originally proposed, had a denomination of 33 cents. By the time it was issued the denomination was 34 cents. This stamp was never issued as a 33 cent stamp.

THE FIRST UNITED STATES SELF ADHESIVE STAMPS:

The first self adhesive stamps issued by the United States were the 10-cent Dove of Peace issue (Scott #1552). This stamp was issued on November 15, 1974 in an imperforated format on rouletted paper backing. Although this stamp design was attractive, the new self-adhesive glue used was anything but to collectors. Over time the glue bled into the stamp, causing yellowing/discoloring. Also, because the stamp was PRECANCELED, it was die cut with "cross slashes" through the dove to prevent removal and reuse, the stamp will separate into layers if soaked. Below is an image of two of these stamps with plate numbers still on the backing paper.





*** COVERS TO SANTA CLAUS AND FATHER CHRISTMAS ***

When you were young did you ever write a letter to Santa Claus telling him how good you have been and that you would like to have him bring the things listed in the letter on Christmas? Of course, these letters and their envelopes (covers) were, if mailed, most likely destroyed by the post office. Maybe your Mom or Dad said they mailed them, never did, but opened them to see what you asked for and bought them for you. In any case, not very many survived. In my travels to stamp shows, I have never seen any, but I did spot some on the Internet Auction site eBay and was fortunate to have won them. Below are images (reduced in size) of two elusive examples that I have. Covers to Santa, Father Christmas, etc, almost never had a return address because, after all, he "knew where you lived".
