

*** THE POSTAL WORKERS STRIKE OF 1970 ***

In 1969 and 1970, a series of dramatic failures in communication and negotiation between NALC national leaders, the White House and NALC membership led to the climatic postal strike of March 15-18, 1970.

At 12:01 a.m. on March 17, 1970, branch 36 of the New York Post Office made history. By a count of 1,555 to 1,055 the postal workers of branch 36, which served Manhattan and the Bronx, voted to go on strike. Word spread quickly and by the 18th, there were more workers picketing not only in New York, but also in the surrounding states. In response, President Nixon appeared on television ordering the postal employees to go back to work or face federal felony charges. The President's demands backfired. The address served only to rally oppressed postal workers and embolden those whom were already picketing.


On March 20th, Winton M. Blount, Postmaster met with union leaders and promised concessions only if the striking employees returned to work. Facing imprisonment union leaders urged the northeastern postal workers to return to work so bargaining could be arranged. At the same time, however, postal workers in other cities voted to join the strike. Other government workers communicated that they would strike in support if the government pursued legal action against the postal employees. Once the news had spread, roughly 200,000 postal workers went on strike from more than 671 locations throughout the United States. The strike was in full effect and the nation's mail system was absolutely crippled.

The strike was successful in completely disrupting the daily business of the country. The well timed strike managed to disrupt the mailing of pension and welfare checks along with tax refunds, census forms, jury summonses, and draft notices. Businesses scrambled to send information by whatever means were available including planes, helicopters, telegrams, and even bicycle messengers. From the government's standpoint, action had to be taken. President Richard Nixon took action by speaking on television regarding the issue and ordering a 24,000 man force codenamed "Operation Graphic Hand" to begin distributing the mail. The pressure on the federal government along with the military being ineffective at distributing the mail led the push for a quick resolution. The postmaster general agreed to negotiate with the seven exclusively recognized unions upon the employees' return to work. The postal workers returned and they negotiated an agreement which stipulated a six percent raise for government workers along with an additional eight percent if the two sides could agree on a way to reorganize the postal system. An agreement was reached between the two sides and congress drafted the Postal Reorganization Act. The new legislation provided the postal workers with a long overdue raise (14%). The Post Office Department became the United States Postal Service. With this change the USPS became a part of the executive branch of the government and the Postmaster General left the cabinet of the President. Also, the USPS gained the ability to change rates to allow for changes in cost and inflation and the postal employees gained the ability to collectively bargain on wages and working conditions just like the private sector.

President Nixon signed the Postal Reorganization Act on August 12 1970 and became effective on July 1, 1971.
