DID YOU KNOW - INTERESTING PHILATELIC FACT:

Some of this information is from Linn's Stamp News

According to The United States Commemorative Stamps of the 20th Century, Volume 2, by Max G. Johl, the stamp subjects for the 1940 Famous Americans set were assigned to the stamps in chronological BIRTH ORDER! For example: In the Educator set of 5, Horace Mann, born in 1796, is on the 1-cent stamp; Mark Hopkins, born in 1802, is on the 2-cent stamp; Charles W. Eliot, born in 1834, is on the 3-cent stamp; Francis E. Williard, born in 1839, is on the 5-cent stamp; and Booker T. Washington, born in 1839, is on the 10-cent stamp.

There were some contemporary complaints about which educator would up on what stamp. Some collectors and alumni complained that Hopkins, the former president of Williams College, should have been on the 3-cent purple (actually bright-red-violet) stamp and Eliot, the former president of Harvard should have been on the 2-cent red (actually rose-carmine) stamp, to match each school's respective colors.

It should also be noted, that Booker T. Washington was the first black (African-American) to appear on a United States postage stamp.

In French: NE PAS LIVRER LE MIMANCHE

In Flemish: NIET BESTELLEN OP ZONTAG

- 1. What do those phrases mean in English?
- 2. What are these issues called?

- 1. The phrases mean (in effect) "Don't Deliver on Sunday"
- 2. These issues were called "DOMINICALS" (by collectors)

*** DON'T DELIVER ON SUNDAY – THE BELGIAN "DOMINICALS" *** (See stamp images of these types of stamps at the top of this Newsletter)

Belgian stamps issued from 1893 to 1913 had se-tenant tabs and are called "dominicals". Leaving the label/tab intact meant that the letter would not be delivered on a Sunday. If you had no objection to Sunday delivery, you could remove the label/tab. You don't get service like that today.

In 1893, the Belgian Post Office issued its first "Never on Sunday" stamps, a definitive set featuring the country's coat of arms on the first five values and King Leopold II on the remaining values.

The designs are not very pretty but were the first stamps featuring the Belgian coat of arms and had a "label" or "tab" attached in French (NE PAS LIVRER DE DIMANCHE) and Flemish (NIET BESTELLEN OP ZONTAG) indicating, in effect "Don't Deliver on Sunday".

What appeared to have caused this was that the Roman Catholic Church and possibly Protestants as well, exerted their influence of "optional" Sunday delivery, at least in Belgium.


If a Christian who wished to keep the Sabbath holy could buy one of the tabbed stamps, known among collectors as "Dominical" stamps, and put the complete stamp with label (tab) on the article to be mailed and ensure that it would not be delivered on a Sunday.

However, if the sender was not particularly devout, and liked the idea of Sunday delivery, or just didn't care one way or the other, he or she could buy the tabbed stamp, tear off the label (tab), put only the stamp on the article to be mailed, which would then be delivered on a Sunday, if that was the next possible day.

Belgium's first pictorial stamps were the three values of the Brussels Exhibition Issue of 1896-97, tabbed stamps featuring two allegorical images of St. Michael fighting Satan in the form of a dragon.

Belgium's "Never on Sunday" stamps had a relatively brief life. In 1910 and 1911, three sets of semi-postal stamps, Belgium's first, were issued in the "Never on Sunday" format. The last Belgian Dominical stamp was issued in 1913.

Dominical postal cards were also issued. As the stamp was pre-printed, the dominical "label/tab" could not be torn off without damaging the postal card, so the sender simply crossed out the "label/tab" image if (s)he preferred Sunday delivery, or left it alone if (s)he wanted to keep the Sabbath holy, or didn't care one way or the other.
