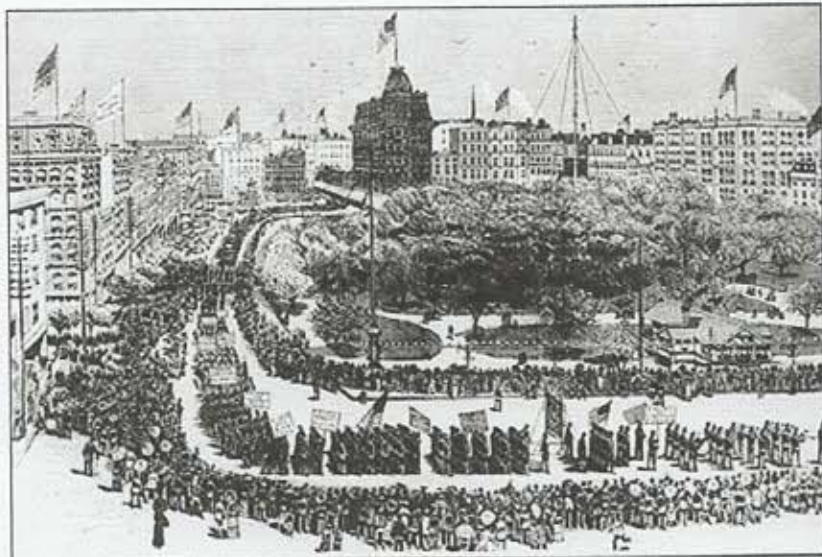

Labor Day is a United States federal holiday observed on the first Monday in September.

The first Labor Day in the United States was observed on August 26, 1878, in Boston, by the Central Labor Union of New York, the nation's first integrated major trade union. It became a federal holiday in 1894, when, following the deaths of a number of workers at the hands of the U.S. military and U.S. Marshals during the Pullman Strike, President Grover Cleveland put reconciliation with the labor movement as a top political priority.

THE FIRST STAMPS FROM THE REPUBLIC OF SOUTH SUDAN

REPUBLIC OF SOUTH SUDAN

The Republic of South Sudan became independent July 9, 2011 and issued its first stamps a few days later.

According to Brigadier General (Rtd) Elijah Biar Kuol, the Director General for Administration and Finance in the Ministry of Telecommunications and Postal Services, 100,000 copies of the stamps have already been distributed to all the states of South Sudan. He said the focus will be in the rural areas where more than 80 percent of the citizens of the Republic of South Sudan live.

The first stamps feature the flag of South Sudan, the coat of arms of South Sudan, and an image of John Garang, a pre-independence leader.

PHILATELIC TRIVIA



This Swedish stamp issued in 1879 clearly shows its value as 20 ore in figures. A quick lesson in Swedish will confuse you because the inscription on the stamp reads 'TRETIO', meaning thirty in Swedish. Twenty in Swedish is 'TJUGO', which is the value that should have been inscribed on the stamp.

The mistake arose in the use of the wrong die in laying down the plate. The central value shown as a numeral and the outer part of the stamp with the value in words would have been entered onto the plate using two separate dies which became mixed up.

Scott Catalogue value of this error stamp is: \$8,250.00 mint and \$5,250.00 used.

OCTOBER 4 (1851) COVER WITH HAWAII SCOTT #1 AND #2



FIRST THREE HAWAIIAN STAMPS – ISSUED OCTOBER 1, 1851

One hundred sixty (160) years ago this month, on October 1, 1851 the first Hawaiian stamps, the so-called "Missionaries," were placed on sale at the Honolulu and Lahaina post offices. The stamps took on the name "Missionaries" because they were nearly always found on correspondence from American missionaries in Hawaii to their families back in California, New York, Connecticut, or Massachusetts. The new stamps were crudely made from type-set material obtained from "THE POLYNESIAN" newspaper and printed on very thin paper. There are only 16 examples of the 2-cent value that have survived, making the 2-cent "Missionary" one of the most valuable stamps in the world today.

By early April, 1852, the fourth stamp was printed to correct confusion and state clearly the 13¢ value was to pay both Hawaiian and United States postage through to any East Coast United States destination.

FIRST STAMPS ANNOUNCED

The postal treaty of 1849 established a more systematic postal arrangement between the United States and Hawaii. And on December 28, 1850, Honolulu Postmaster General Henry M. Whitney published a decree in "THE POLYNESIAN" newspaper announcing the new postal union treaty and postage rates. Three new stamps would be printed in Honolulu (2 cent, 5 cent, and 13 cent). Newspapers and printed circulars would cost 2 cents postage. Postage for letters to any west coast city would be 8 cents (5 cents for Hawaii, 3 cents for the U.S.) Postage for letters to east coast cities would be 13 cents (5 cents for Hawaii, 8 cents for the U.S.).

Looking for a new stamp topic to collect? Why not Halloween? While not to many stamps are currently available, there are other areas like covers, postal history, First Day covers and other interesting related material out there ready to be discovered. Some foreign countries that issued Halloween stamps, souvenir sheets, etc. are Belgium, France, Grenadines (SS Sheet of 6 – Scott #2521a) and Guineu-Bissau.

Halloween (also spelled Hallowe'en) is an annual holiday observed on October 31.

It has roots in the Celtic festival of Samhain and the Christian holiday All Saints' Day, but is today largely a secular celebration.

It is, primarily observed in regions of the Western world, and among those that do the traditions and importance of the celebration vary significantly. A much celebrated holiday in Ireland and Scotland, mass transatlantic Irish and Scottish immigration in the 19th century popularized Halloween in North America. The holiday is celebrated to a lesser extent in other parts of the world.

THE "REDESIGNED" 1852 13-CENT HAWAII STAMP

MURDERED FOR THE 2-CENT 1851 HAWAIIAN

The valuable 2-cent "Missionary" created a tale with a Sherlock Holmesian twist to it back in 1892. Gaston Leroux, a man of means living in Paris, was found murdered in his home. The police were baffled; they could find no motive, for jewelry, gold and a large sum of money were left untouched. But one detective on the case was by chance a philatelist and he found that the victim had a very valuable collection of stamps. He also observed that the 2-cent blue Hawaiian in the collection was missing. Contacting every stamp shop in Paris to see if the stamp had shown up produced no results. He then sought out Leroux's friends, and - *voila* - he found one who was also a stamp collector. One step led to another, with the result that after gaining the acquaintance of one Hector Giroux, he found that Giroux too had a collection including Hawaiian stamps, one of which was a 2-cent blue. Under questioning, Giroux confessed, and he was hanged for his crime, all due to his uncontrolled desire to have a 2-cent Missionary stamp at any cost.

In 1621, the Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Indians shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies. For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving were celebrated by individual colonies and states.

In 1817, New York became the first of several states to officially adopt an annual Thanksgiving holiday; each celebrated it on a different day, however, and the American South remained largely unfamiliar with the tradition. In 1827, the noted magazine editor and prolific writer Sarah Josepha Hale—author, among countless other things, of the nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb"—launched a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday. For 36 years, she published numerous editorials and sent scores of letters to governors, senators, presidents and other politicians. Abraham Lincoln finally heeded her request in 1863, at the height of the Civil War, in a proclamation entreating all Americans to ask God to "commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife" and to "heal the wounds of the nation." He scheduled Thanksgiving for the final Thursday in November, and it was celebrated on that day every year until 1939, when Franklin D. Roosevelt moved the holiday up a week in an attempt to spur retail sales during the Great Depression. Roosevelt's plan, known derisively as Franksgiving, was met with passionate opposition, and on December 26, 1941 the president reluctantly signed a bill making Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November.

Since 1947, the National Turkey Federation has presented the President of the United States with one live turkey and two dressed turkeys, in a ceremony known as the National Thanksgiving Turkey Presentation. In a tradition that began as a one-off joke by Ronald Reagan in 1987 and made permanent by George H. W. Bush in 1989, the live turkey is "pardoned" and lives out the rest of its days on a nearby peaceful farm. There are legends that state that the "pardoning" tradition dates to the Harry Truman administration or even to an anecdote of Abraham Lincoln pardoning his son's pet turkey; both stories have been quoted in more recent presidential speeches, but neither has any evidence in the Presidential record. In more recent years, two turkeys have been pardoned, in case the original turkey becomes unavailable for presidential pardoning.

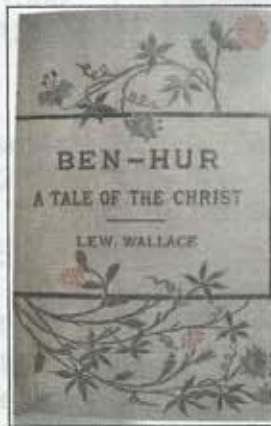

LEARNING HISTORY BY RESEARCHING A COVER

Lewis (Lew) Wallace was born in Brookville, Indiana, on April 10, 1827. When his father was elected governor of Indiana in 1837 Wallace's interest in reading was stimulated by his new proximity to the state library. He became a reporter for the *Indianapolis Daily Journal* for one year, but when the Mexican War broke out he left to raise a company of soldiers. After the war Wallace served as a member of the Indiana state Senate from 1856 to 1860.

A general during the Civil War, he was distinguished as a leader and fighter, and he was credited with saving Cincinnati from the Confederate Army on July 9, 1864. He also served on the court-martial tribunal that tried the accomplices of John Wilkes Booth, President Lincoln's assassin. Wallace served as governor of New Mexico Territory from 1878 to 1881 and as the minister to The Ottoman Empire (Turkey) from 1881 to 1885.

During his term as governor, he was asked by Billy the Kid (William H. Bonney, born Henry McCarty, Jr.) a participant in the Lincoln County War for an amnesty "deal". Wallace agreed but due to political forces then ruling New Mexico, was unable to come through on his end of the bargain.

Also while serving as governor, Wallace completed the novel that made him famous: *Ben-Hur: A Tale of the Christ* (1880). It grew to be the best-selling American novel of the 19th century. The book has never been out of print and has been filmed four times.

During the last years of his life Wallace lectured extensively. He died on February 15, 1905, at Crawfordsville, Indiana.

You never know when you find a stamp or cover what interesting things can be found out by researching the item. In this case the cover image was "captured" from the eBay auction website. The additional research was accomplished via various Internet websites and the Scott Stamp Catalogue. Stamp and postal history collecting can be a very rewarding experience. (NOTE: the cover sold on eBay for \$109.40)

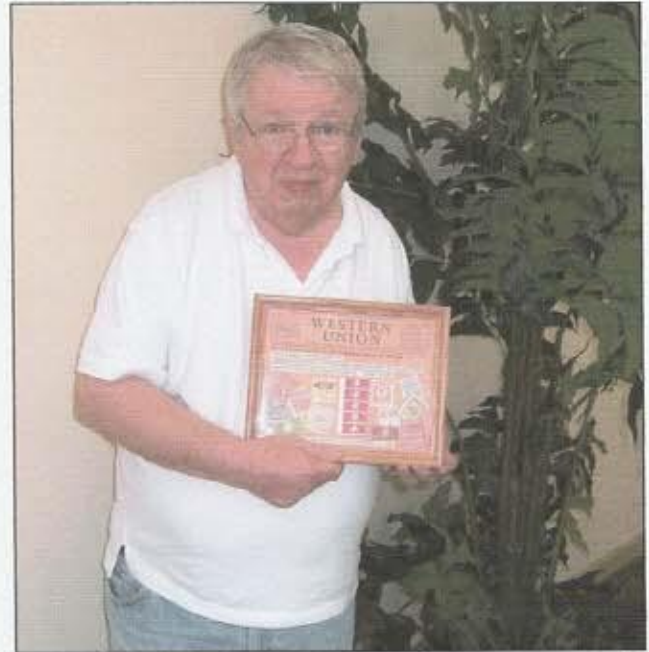

SANTA CLAUS, INDIANA

Santa Claus was established in 1854. In 1856, when the town (then known as Santa Fe, mispronounced "fee") was working to establish a Post Office, the US Postal Service refused their first application as there was already another Santa Fe in the state. Several town meetings were held, during which the name Santa Claus was selected.

The Santa Claus Post Office is the only post office in the world with the Santa Claus name!

The town's name did not peak interest however, until 1914 when Santa Claus' 14th postmaster, James Martin, took it upon himself to answer the children's letters.

In 1929, Ripley featured the town's post office in his nationally-syndicated "Believe It or Not" newspaper cartoon. The feature thrust Santa Claus, Indiana into the national spotlight and the following Christmas its little post office was flooded with over a million pieces of mail. The town would never be the same again.

Soon after, people flocked to the Santa Claus Post Office to get the special postmark; so much that in the early 1930s the US Postal Department suggested changing the name of the town to avoid the Christmas season frenzy. Fortunately, for everyone, that did not happen!

On Christmas Day 1935 (SEE CARD AT THE LEFT), Carl Barrett dedicated a 22 foot tall statue of Santa Claus on the highest hill in town. The statue was the centerpiece attraction of Santa Claus Park, the town's second themed attraction. The statue which was funded through children's penny donations is situated on the highest hill in town and rests on a star-shaped platform whose principal point faces east, symbolic of the Christmas Star. A time capsule rests below the statues base.

James Martin continued answering letters and eventually enlisted Jim Yellig to aid in helping him write back to children across the world. Today, the non-profit organization, Santa's Elves Inc, and the Santa Claus Museum, organize volunteers to answer all the children's letters that flood this tiny post office during the holidays. Approximately 12,000 letters are answered each year.

The United States Christmas Seals were issued by the American National Red Cross from 1907-1819, the National Tuberculosis Association from 1920-1967, the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association from 1968-1972 and the American Lung Association from 1973-present.

Issued 100 years ago, the 1911 seal is titled "The Old Home Among the Cedars." The designer was Anton Rudert under direction of F. D. Milliet. and generated \$320,000 in sales.

Beginning in 1979 there is no longer one national issue.
